### SPOTLIGHT ON KELLOGG SCHOLARS NETWORK

Meet Community Health Scholars Program alumnus, Michael Reece, PhD...

Dr. Michael Reece is the Director of the <u>Center for Sexual Health Promotion</u>, and Associate Professor of Public Health at Indiana University, where he also holds faculty appointments at the Kinsey Institute for Research in Sex, Gender, and Reproduction and in the African Studies Program. Michael received his Ph.D. in Health Behavior at the University of Georgia and his MPH in Health Promotion from the Graduate School of Public Health at San Diego State University. His research is focused on sexual health in both domestic and international settings and is conducted under the auspices of his research team at the Center for Sexual Health Promotion.

Most recently, Michael and his colleagues completed a large nationally representative study of sexual behavior and sexual health of individuals ranging in age from 14 to 94 years in the U.S. The first nine papers from the study were published in a special issue of *The Journal of Sexual Medicine* and are currently available online for free download at www.nationalsexstudy.indiana.edu.

During Michael's year in the Community Health Scholars Program at Johns Hopkins University (2000-2001), he worked closely with two community-based organizations, Health Care for the Homeless (HCH) in Baltimore, Maryland, and Positive Impact, Inc., in Atlanta, Georgia. At Positive Impact, an Atlanta area mental health clinic for low income, HIV affected individuals, he explored the factors associated with sustaining a long-distance research partnership. This partnership with Positive Impact that was further developed during his time with CHSP continues today with an active agenda of research related to the provision of mental health services to individuals who otherwise would lack the resources to access such care. During his CHSP year, Michael was also the Program Planning Chair of the Community Based Public Health Caucus and organized the first slate of scientific sessions for the 2001 APHA Annual Meeting.

Of the contribution that CHSP has made to his career, Michael says, "I had a history of working in communities before coming to CHSP, and the program helped me to make the transition from practitioner to researcher in a way that ensured the research never became more important than the core mission and functions of any organization with which I am working. For me, the value of the CBPR principles also extends beyond research; I find them helpful in daily interactions with both colleagues and students and they provide a solid general framework for succeeding in a faculty position."

#### Opportunities for the Future of Behavioral Health Services Arlington, VA April 6-7, 2010

#### Deadline: December 3, 2010, 5:00 p.m. Eastern

Drug and alcohol addiction and mental health disorders are prevalent, often go untreated, and if treated, the process of care for these conditions often does not meet basic quality standards. Receiving adequate service for behavioral health disorders is especially acute in the most vulnerable and needy groups, including older populations, racial/ethnic minorities, persons with lower educational levels, and those with early onset of behavioral health disorders. These groups often delay seeking care, or seek care in the general healthcare sector rather than in specialty mental health service settings. The lack of attention to behavioral healthcare conditions contributes to global disease burden and is a significant cause of disability. It is now well-recognized that the co-occurrence of DAAMH and general medical disorders is high, and comorbidity and mortality increase when conditions co-occur, often resulting in the utilization of acute medical services. A focus on disparities in service access and delivery has increased over the past decade, even predating the IOM's 2003 report entitled Unequal Treatment: Confronting Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Health Care. Emphasizing the need for a coordinated focus in research addressing healthcare disparities. The National Institutes of Health recently (September, 2010) announced the transition of the National Center on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NCMHD) to the National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD). The NIMHD will plan, coordinate, review, and evaluate minority health and health disparities research activities conducted and supported by the NIH institutes and centers. To further emphasize the need to prioritize research examining behavioral healthcare disparities, this conference seeks to examine investigative efforts focused on:

- Disparities in behavioral healthcare service access and delivery;
- Innovative strategies to decrease disparities in diverse populations (gender-based, racial/ethnic minorities) and settings (rural vs. urban; primary and mental healthcare);
- Disparities in general health care access occurring as the result of the presence of a behavioral healthcare condition;
- Issues of stigma and cultural salience as they impact service access and delivery, and
- Healthcare policy and legislative changes impacting behavioral health service disparities.

This scientific conference will encourage linkages between the often separate areas of behavioral services research into a more integrative behavioral health services research (BHSR) platform and will emphasize the a 'key theme' of the National Healthcare Disparities Report (AHRQ, 2009) related to service disparities experienced by persons with mental health and substance use disorders. In this third year of a 3-year NIDA R13 scientific conference grant (with additional support provided by NIMH and NIAAA), conference organizers will continue their effort to 1) develop a collaborative and strategic research agenda to improve access to and the quality of behavioral healthcare to people (across the life span) who suffer from drug abuse, problematic alcohol use, and mental health problems, and, 2) engage and partner researchers and other key stakeholders such as afflicted individuals, families, providers, policymakers, and communities to contribute to and implement a quality improvement agenda. A 'virtual collaboratory' will also be used to connect conference participants and to encourage and support the development of new research teams. Currently there is no one place for addictions, mental health and alcohol services researchers to meet exclusively and at one time on shared priority topics germane to behavioral health services research (BHSR). No professional group or association for BHSR exists. Common problems abound and often work does not cross the disciplines, so this 2011 scientific conference will highlight innovative strategies that explore and address the issue of services disparities in the delivery of behavioral healthcare focusing on a broad range of research examining

- 'State of the Art' interventions developed to close the gap in disparities
- The roles different settings, including homes, schools, and workplaces, can play in creating and changing disparities
- Patient-provider interactions as they contribute to or ameliorate disparities
- Community-based participatory research on service disparities
- The role of cultural competence in addressing disparities
- Improvements in the measurement of service disparities and impacts, and,
- Healthcare financing, legislation, and policy changes as they influence service disparities

The conference will be held in Arlington, VA on April 6-7, 2011 with post-conference methods workshops on morning of April 8th. The Ritz Carlton Pentagon City (Arlington, VA) will be the setting for this year's meeting. Individual paper, poster, think tank and symposia abstracts are being solicited. Racial/ethnic minorities suffer disproportionate morbidity and mortality from chronic diseases such as cancer, heart disease, diabetes and stroke. Although racial/ethnic differences in morbidity and mortality can be partially explained by differences in lifestyle, health behavior. and financial access to care, these factors do not entirely explain differences in incidence, treatment, or outcomes. Several reports show that racial/ethnic minorities also less frequently receive appropriate care, which adversely impacts their health outcomes- including poorer survival, higher recurrence rates, and greater morbidity and mortality. Racial/ethnic discrimination is often identified as a contributor to racial/ethnic disparities in health outcomes but is rarely specifically examined in this context. Purpose: The Applied Research and the Behavioral Research Programs of the Division of Cancer Control and Population Sciences (DCCPS) of the National Cancer Institute (NCI), National Institutes of Health (NIH) are sponsoring a special theme issue of the American Journal of Public Health to highlight results of recent research on the measurement and impact of discrimination in the health care setting. Studies appropriate for consideration for inclusion in the special issue include but are not limited to: Descriptive and analytic studies that examine racial/ethnic discrimination as a risk factor for racial/ethnic disparities in disease incidence, treatment, and outcomes; • Studies that report on the development of new data collection modalities and the evaluation of existing data collection instruments/modalities for measuring discrimination or response to discrimination; Studies that report on innovative methods of measuring racial/ethnic discriminatory behavior, perception of exposure to racial/ethnic discrimination, and novel approaches to analyzing quantitative and qualitative data for the purpose of describing discriminatory behavior and exposure to racial/ethnic discrimination; . Studies that examine the impact of institutional racism in health care delivery systems or policies and its contribution to racial/ethnic health disparities; • Studies that report findings from the development and evaluation of cross-cultural communication interventions aimed at reducing discriminatory behavior, the perception of exposure to racial/ethnic discrimination, and the health-related consequences of racial/ethnic discrimination; - Studies that examine bias/discriminatory attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors that may influence/limit access to diagnostic technologies and therapies for racial/ethnic minorities; Studies that examine the biological and psychosocial pathways that link exposure to discrimination and health. Your abstract should not exceed 300 words, and should include the objectives, methods (including a short description of the independent, dependent, and intervening variables), results, and conclusions. Overview: The Health Disparities and Social Justice Conference hosted by DePaul University's Master of Public Health (MPH) Program will provide an opportunity to increase skills in identifying and addressing a wide variety of health disparities in diverse communities. It will also provide a valuable context for dialogue among a range of health and community experts who share DePaul's mission to address social injustices and community health practices in marginalized groups. A special focus on women's health will be central to this year's conference. This conference is provided free-of-charge to those interested in public health. The conference will take place at DePaul University's DePaul Center, 1 E. Jackson Blvd, Chicago, Illinois, on Friday, January 28th, 2011 from 8:30am-4:00pm. Presentations will take the form of skills-building workshops. The learning exchanges that take place at the conference will provide attendees with an improved ability to enrich the lives of those at highest risk for poor health outcomes, including members of various groups who experience social oppression and marginalization. #### The Public Health Critical Race Methodology: Praxis for Antiracism Research. Ford CL and Airhihenbuwa CO. Social Science & Medicine 2010 Oct. 71(8):1390-8.

Abstract: The number of studies targeting racial health inequities and the capabilities for measuring racism effects have grown substantially in recent years. Still, the need remains for a public health framework that moves beyond merely documenting disparities toward eliminating them. Critical Race

Theory (CRT) has been the dominant influence on racial scholarship since the 1980s; however, its jurisprudential origins have, until now, limited its application to public health research. To improve the ease and fidelity with which health equity research applies CRT, this paper introduces the Public

Health Critical Race praxis (PHCR). PHCR aids the study of contemporary racial phenomena, illuminates disciplinary conventions that may inadvertently reinforce social hierarchies and offers tools for racial

equity approaches to knowledge production.

### What Changes in Survival Rates Tell Us About U.S. Health Care The Commonwealth Fund

The *Health Affairs* Web First article, written by Peter Muennig and Sherry Glied of Columbia University, examines health spending, behavioral risk factors like obesity and smoking, and 15-year survival rates for men and women ages 45 and 65 in the U.S. and 12 other advanced nations. The findings reported show that while the U.S. has achieved gains in 15-year survival rates decade by decade between 1975 and 2005, other countries have experienced greater gains, even as per capita health care spending in the U.S. increased at more than twice the rate of the comparison countries. Forty-five year old U.S. white women fared the worst: by 2005, their 15-year survival rates were lower than that of all the other countries. Meanwhile, the U.S. ranking for 15-year life expectancy for 45-year-old men fell from third in 1975 to 12th in 2005.In comparing risk factors among the 13 countries, the researchers found very little difference in smoking habits between the U.S. and the comparison countries-in fact, the U.S. had faster

declines in smoking between 1975 and 2005 than almost all the other countries. And while people in the U.S. are more likely to be obese, this was also the case in 1975, when the U.S. was not so far behind in life expectancy. The researchers say that the failure of the U.S. to make greater gains in survival rates despite its greater spending on health care may be attributable to flaws in the overall health care system, specifically the role of unregulated fee-for-service payments and an overreliance on specialty care. "This study provides stark evidence that the U.S. health care system has been failing Americans for years," said Commonwealth Fund president Karen Davis. "The good news is that the Affordable Care Act will take significant steps to improve our health care system and the health of Americans by expanding health insurance, improving primary care, and holding health care organizations accountable for their patients' overall health."

The WHO Collaborating Centre for Knowledge Translation and Health Technology Assessment in Health Equity, housed at the Centre for Global Health at the University of Ottawa, is currently in the process of updating and expanding its Equity-Oriented Toolkit. The Equity -Oriented Toolkit is based on a needs-based model of HTA. It provides tools that explicitly consider health equity at each of the four steps of health technology assessment: 1) Burden of Illness,

- 2) Community Effectiveness,
- 3) Economic Evaluation,
- 4) Knowledge Translation and Implementation.

It also incorporates concepts of health impact assessment within the HTA process. They are seeking suggestions on validated and widely disseminated HTA tools that explicitly consider health equity and that are relevant to the toolkit. We are excited to announce the launch of a new listserv to support the community of university and community scholars and researchers who are interested in cross-institutional collaboration. At the May 2010 Meeting of Community-Campus Partnerships for Health (CCPH) held in Portland Oregon, one of the concurrent sessions shared the history, promises and challenges in the development of the Chicago Consortium for Community Engagement or C3. This conversation was enhanced by other participants who were engaged in similar efforts across the country. By consensus, those present concluded that a vehicle to continue the discussion would be valuable, providing an opportunity to share experiences and solutions to challenges in coordinating community engaged/participatory research by location, for example a city, rather than by single institutions. What will it take to encourage and sustain partnerships across institutions and communities? How can we share information, important findings and knowledge with all community partners regardless of organizational or institutional affiliations? The session leaders, Cynthia Barnes-Boyd of the University of Illinois at Chicago and Jen Kauper-Brown of Northwestern University in Chicago, agreed to present a proposal to CCPH to host a listserv to support this kind of dialogue. They enthusiastically supported the idea and now we're underway! As interest in community-based research grows and full community involvement in research becomes a funding priority, an increasing number of academic institutions and community partners are engaging in community research partnerships focused on addressing local health issues. In metropolitan or regional areas with multiple universities and colleges, these academic institutions may find that they are working with the same communities and struggling with the same partnership issues. This listserv will serve as a vehicle to discuss issues and post information and resources related to the mechanisms, benefits, and challenges of cross-institutional community-engaged work. We hope participants will share ideas, pose questions, and explore opportunities for collaboration and mutual support. In the future, listserv participants may identify other activities that will help to further discussion and action on this issue (e.g. teleconference calls, conference sessions, regional gatherings).
